1) General

Three project representatives from Corridor Resources/AMEC and eleven community representatives attended the fourth meeting of the Community Liaison Committee on February 12, 2007, at the Penobscis Fire Hall. Jamie Daley, resident/Fire Department representative chaired the meeting. Guests included: Mike Bannister, Production Superintendent, Corridor Resources Inc.; Bruce Northrup, Kings East MLA; Donna Murray, resident; and Fred Van de Brand, resident/Fire Department.

Minutes from the January 17, 2007 Community Liaison Committee were reviewed and approved without any changes. The outstanding Action Items from the previous meeting were discussed and new issues were identified.

The next Committee meeting will take place on Monday, March 12, 7:00 pm at the Penobscis Fire Hall.

2) Project Updates

Ken Chapman, the on-site AMEC Health and Safety Manager, provided a construction update and an overview of the safety statistics for the Project. The Project has been progressing well. The status of the transmission pipeline is as follows: welding 90% complete; stringing 90% complete; tie-ins 35% complete; and ditching/lowering/backfilling 65% complete. The horizontal directional drilling for the transmission line is 17 of 39 completed. The status of the gathering system is as follows: stringing 70% complete; welding 50% complete; ditching/lowering/backfilling 15% complete; and no

tie-ins completed yet. The horizontal directional drilling for the gathering system is 6 of 17 completed.

The safety statistics for the Project include a total of approximately 102,000 man-hours, 1 lost time accident (with 1 day of lost time), 2 restricted work cases, no first aids or medical treatments and 15 near miss reports. There are currently 24 contractors involved in the project and over 357 site safety orientations have been given to individuals to date.

Corridor and AMEC took federal Environment Canada officials from Dartmouth, NS, on a site tour on February 8, 2007, so they could become more familiar with the construction activity.

2) Update on Action Items and New Issues

- **Pipeline access and patrols** – A Committee member noted that there is heavy traffic by ATV use on the RoW near the Creek Road.
- **Watershed Restoration** – Corridor met with the Kennebecasis Watershed Restoration Committee on February 1. They are preparing a work list of items that they consider worthwhile for restoration work along the Kennebecasis River within the McCully Project footprint.
- **Charles Perry Road** – A concern was raised with respect to the maintenance of this road. It falls between Kings County and Queens County and there is an ongoing issue associated with what district is financially responsible for the road maintenance. Corridor will be making use of this road for access to its pipeline. It was suggested that Corridor could facilitate discussions with both counties to address the situation. *ACTION: Corridor will repair any damages incurred by Corridor when the work is completed in that area.*
- **Next Drill Location** – A Public Meeting will be held on the proposed drill locations L-38 and O-76. *UPDATE: Information packages were passed out to residents in the affected areas and Corridor held the information meeting on Monday, February 19, 7 pm at the Timberland Motel. A summary of the issues raised during this meeting were distributed to the residents who received the original information package. It is available for committee members upon request.*
- **Community Investment** – A list of ideas was compiled from the Committee Members as follows:
 - Scholarships:
 - ◇ Students from the affected areas studying in areas such as Environment, Exploration, Geology, Energy and Engineering
 - ◇ Students in affected areas of gas plants and drill pads receiving scholarships for post secondary education (approx. 5-10 students per year graduate in area)
 - ◇ Adult scholarship – furthering education, retraining (in gas related area)

- The Playground committee at the Penobsquis Baptist Church is in the process of creating a playground for the community and would like financial assistance.
- Outdoor rink with cement bottom and boarded sides.
- Combined sports area with asphalt/cement floor and fencing for variety of sports interchangeable on one surface for ball hockey, basketball, volleyball, tennis, etc.
- Contributions towards local schools annual Awards Day presentations.
- Preservation of historic buildings and/or sites in the affected areas.
- Contributions towards local recreational groups, i.e. Ball fields, outdoor rinks, etc.
- Contribution to projects that protect wetlands and other sensitive areas within the affect areas.
- Contribution toward community owned and operated seniors' complexes
- Contribution towards local infrastructure projects, i.e. water and sewage, sidewalks where applicable.
- Upgrades to Women's Institute/Seniors Hall. *UPDATE: Received written request from Women's Institute looking for financial assistance on hall renovations, i.e. windows and insulation of basement and attic, kitchen renovation, new tables and chairs and upgrading driveway and parking lot (see attached).*
